Spelling: Students will be doing Lesson 32. They will be working on words with oi and ou. The words are sound, frown, soil, mouth, now, toy, oil, spoil, noise, owl, crowd, tower, around, pound, and boil. The Spelling Test will be on Friday.

Reading: For Reading, students will read a non-fiction story about hermit crabs. Students will later have an opportunity to compare and contrast both stories about this type of crab. Please encourage the students to read their weekly stories utilizing a good tone of voice, appropriate fluency and expression. Every day, there is a group of students who read to me.

Writing: Students will finish writing the original story that they have been working on.

Math: Next week, students will continue learning about balancing equations. Unknown variables will be added to the equations. Students are working on using the property of 10 strategy to get to the answer quicker.

Social Studies: Next week, students will present their floats. Please continue to practice presenting information and questions at home.

Bible: For Bible, students will continue learning about the resurrection of Jesus and the days that followed. Students will learn about the story of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples. There will be no memory verse as students are preparing for their presentations.

Phew! What an incredible week! As I write this, the children are already exhausted and we still have one more night of performance to go! It has been so worth it though and I can't help but think that we were the coolest sea creatures on the stage! CCAT

Over the past few days, the children have been practicing for the Canadian Cognitive Abilities Test (CCAT). It is standardized which is to say that marks are normed against Canadian standards of Grade 3 students across the country. The accommodations and modifications that good teachers naturally apply in daily teaching are not allowed on the test. This test is also different from the way that I have been teaching since there is no discussion, learning extensions, nor an ability to ask for clarification. The questions are all multiple choice and there is a time limit for each section. The test will include reading, phonics, spelling, grammar/writing conventions, calculations and math. It will be given over 4 days. The results will be scored by an outside agency electronically and shared back to the school. The purpose of the test is to ensure that the children are on-track compared to Canadian standards but also to help teachers assess how we might help particular students or groups of students to improve their academic abilities.

The children can not study for the test! Preparation at home should be around calming strategies.

While all test scores have an importance; too much stress on a student's ability to perform on the test will be counter-productive. I use words like, "Just try your best! I already know how smart you are!" Echoing these at home will help the children feel relaxed and ready to work at questions in the test in a more relaxed way which will ultimately provide the most accurate and best results. It is essential to remember that the test is absolutely <u>NOT</u> a predictor of future success or career options! The test is simply a <u>snapshot</u> of 4 days of hard work where students use the best of their strategies.

So, how can you help at home? Keep your child relaxed and calm about the test. Reassure them that there will be no punishment or reward except for doing his/her very best! Make sure that your child has a healthy and filling breakfast on test days (May 20-23) and has plenty of healthy snacks. Sugary

breakfasts can often cause children to crash in energy very quickly. Talk about the test as he/she writes it when you are together. Discuss great strategies that your child used and be his/her cheerleaders!

I am not worried at all! Your child has worked hard all year and learned a very great deal! The test will tell us some information but you and I already know just how wonderful, talented, smart, and creative he/she is!

Learning Focus for Next Week

Bible:

Next week in class:

- **Grade 8** The unit test for *Sciences en folie* is Tuesday, May 13. An outline & review guide was provided this week.
- **Grade 7** Students have been gaining momentum as they revise their articles and complete their magazines. Following the magazine presentations students will begin a new unit called *D'un océan à l'autre* in which they will learn about a variety of Francophone communities across Canada and compare First Nation and Métis cultural activities with their own.
- **Grade 6** Next week students will identify problems at home, in the community, in our country and around the world that need creative solutions. Students will choose one for which to create a new invention or solution for their final project. Next week, students will read about one young man's solution to a problem he identified.
- **Grade 5** This week students revised their versions of *Les tacos pour souper* around the musical practices. Next week, students will practice and present their stories. Our grammar focus is reviewing when to use *indefinite articles, definite articles, or partitive articles.*
- **Grade 4** As many students from Grade 4 were in practices for *Finding Nemo Junior* during French class, we have delayed beginning the unit *Mystère* until next week. Students will begin to learn vocabulary for rooms in a house.
- **Grade 3** Next week students will learn French vocabulary for the parts of a plant and what a plant needs to grow. The students will plant a variety of seeds and watch them grow over the next few weeks.
- **Kindergarten to Grade 2** Students continue their plant studies with parts of a plant. As we have class once a week, I send the vocabulary/activity pages home after class so that you may see what vocabulary has been introduced in class and follow up as you wish at home. I demonstrate and use the vocabulary in class through a variety of activities, but at this stage your child isn't expected to memorize it all yet. As we return to the similar themes in Kindergarten through Grade 2, they have the opportunity to recall the vocabulary and use more of it as their comprehension grows. In JK they hear the vocabulary; in SK they recall and add details; in Grade 1 we learn simple phrases; in Grade 2 we review phrases and add details. It is a privilege to partner with you in introducing French to your child.
